

After years of review, regulators have released the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for Midas Gold's proposed gold and antimony mine just outside of Yellow Pine, Idaho. The U.S. Forest Service is accepting public comments on the DEIS through October 13.

ISSA voted to support this project after many conversations and interactions with Midas Gold. The company has made it clear to us that they want to keep the backcountry open to everyone and they will work with us to preserve access to the places we love and recreate. The Stibnite Gold Project is located in a historical mining district that was abandoned after decades of mining. The area needs repair. Midas Gold intentionally designed its plans to use mining to fix the legacy issues that remain on site today. The company will be able to improve water quality, reconnect salmon to their native spawning grounds for the first time in more than 80 years and fix the largest source of sedimentation in the watershed.

The project would also produce the only domestically mined source of antimony in the U.S. The federal government has designated antimony as a critical mineral for its applications in national defense, aerospace and energy industries. Currently, most of the world's supply of this mineral is controlled by China and Russia.
